

In later years, when such gifts were given (including simply a complementary statement or a rendered service of some kind), rewards were expected. This created problems for the church and Saint Leo IX (Pope from 1049 to 1054) worked hard to stop this practice. He created several regulations against "Simony". His picture is shown above. A reform movement during this time called the "Investiture Controversy" also focused on this problem.
